The next day, we went to Sekolah Alam Indonesia, a rather interesting school. We learned about how the school encourages students to "go through what the earth goes through". It has an environmentally friendly curriculum which focuses more on how to reduce, reuse and recycle rather than the usual subjects that we are familiar with like Math and Science. As part of the programme, we handmade tote bags. Following that, we went to a technology business company, Kinobi. Interestingly, we learned how to start a business as well as the importance of forming alliances and friendships. A truly eye-opening experience for me.





On the third day, we visited three places: the Textile Museum, Taman Mini and Thamrin City. Firstly, at the Textile Museum, we learned how to make our own batik by using a canting which is a tool used to make batik. I now appreciate the artistic elements in designing the traditional batik.

Taman Mini "Indonesia Indah", which spans over 150 hectares, represents 33 provinces' cultures in a miniature archipelago with regional pavilions, traditional architecture, regional arts, recreation parks, and rides to explore. The place offers visitors recreational facilities, arts, recreation, and education. Lastly, we visited Thamrin City where they sold many souvenirs. We bought some souvenirs there too.



On the final day, we toured the National Monument of Jakarta called Monas. Inside the tall building is a small museum we visited to learn more about the history of Indonesia. Sadly, after that, we had to depart from Jakarta to return home.



Undeniably, all of us enjoyed our four-day and three-night trip. It was such a memorable experience. It was sad for the journey to come to an end. We hope to be able to explore such places again soon.

It immersed me in the different foods and customs in Thailand, particularly the "Decoding Thainess" exhibition. There were a myriad of interactive elements, even as far as allowing us to dress in traditional Thai clothing!







Lastly, we also had the chance to visit a rice paddy field! It was interesting to try out life as a rice farmer and learn about the methods used in the past to separate the rice husks. We also had the opportunity to experience painting with natural dyes made with materials such as turmeric, butterfly pea flower and many more. The cherry on top was making cute elephants (which in Thai is known as 'Chang') out of clay by pinching and molding it with our hands!




